




Your gifts matter. You matter.

- A gift accepted with a restricted purpose will be used for that purpose.
- Whenever feasible, and especially with gifts of endowment, annual reports will be shared with the benefactor.
- The value of any substantial benefits resulting from a gift will be reported to the benefactor.
- Gifts will be accounted for using generally accepted accounting principles, which will provide consistent, timely, and accurate reporting of all gifts into the University's official financial record.
- Proper recognition will always be given to the benefactor; recognition of a public nature will first be approved by the benefactor.

The Melissa Cook Memorial Foundation Scholarship

The Melissa Cook Memorial Foundation
Scholarship serves as a perpetual tribute
to the late Melissa Cook and to her
family's belief that from tragedy can spring
hope for the future. Melissa, a 1994
Notre Dame alumna, died in 2002 when
scaffolding from the John Hancock
Center in Chicago fell onto her car. The
scholarship, established by Melissa's
mother and stepfather, Linda and Paul
Demo, provides a full four years of tuition,
room, and board to deserving students

who have demonstrated financial need.

A scholarship recipient herself—
for softball—Melissa played third base,
shortstop, and catcher for the Lady Irish,
while earning a degree in accountancy.
Her educational experience and the
friendships she forged on the field and
in her classrooms, dormitory, and larger
campus community had a major influence
in shaping the young woman Melissa
would become.

In 2016, the first Cook Memorial Scholars will, like Melissa before them, graduate from the University of Notre Dame. The scholarship's current recipients are John Gore and Eric Zidarich.

In addition to the scholarship, the Demos previously donated funds for the Melissa Cook Softball Stadium, which was dedicated in 2008.



Glynn Family Honors Program Professor in Arts and Letters

Notre Dame Provost Thomas G. Burish has praised their "uncommon generosity" and "insightful understanding of education." Their gifts to endow the Glynn Family Honors Program have allowed Notre Dame to compete successfully for the nation's very top students.

For John ('62) and Barbara Glynn, however, these laudable achievements are rooted in John's decidedly modest upbringing in Virginia, as the son of a fervent a young person's mind and character," subway alum who wanted nothing more than to see his son at Notre Dame.

The couple's gifts have addressed a spectrum of needs at the University John calls "his first love"—from research endowments and scholarships, to the prestigious Glynn Family Honors Program and its attendant faculty endowments. Their newest endowment, a professorship in the College of Arts and Letters that will play a key role in the honors curriculum, promises to further burnish Notre Dame's tradition of excellence in undergraduate education.

"Teachers have a definitive impact on says John, founder and president of Glynn Capital Management. "I may not

remember everything I learned at Notre Dame, but I can certainly tell you who my best teachers were."

Other Glynn professorships in the honors program have brought students under the tutelage of such notable scholars as Harvard-trained philosopher Paul Weithman and Susannah Monta, a specialist in the intersection of religion and literature, who serves as editor of an international journal of the same name.



For Notre Dame's iconic Hesburgh Library, the 2013–14 academic year marked 50 years of standing tall and serving the Notre Dame community—an anniversary that coincided neatly with a half-century of support from the Holzgrefe family.

"My grandfather, Fritz Holzgrefe Sr., was an early contributor to the library," says Fritz III. "He is listed in the benefactor scrolls on the first floor." Fritz's parents continued the family tradition, establishing the Fritz and Ellen Holzgrefe Family Library Endowment. In 2006, a third

generation of Holzgrefes created the Fritz Holzgrefe III and Regis Watson Family General Library Endowment.

Fritz III and his wife, Mary Jo, are members of the Class of 1990, while Regis Holzgrefe Watson and her husband, Jim, are 1997 alumni.

"Notre Dame really is a connection for our family on many levels," says
Fritz III. "We are spread out all over the country, but we always have Notre Dame in common." The family supports the Hesburgh Libraries because they have the potential to impact each student on campus—and they contribute to the

University because it has the potential to impact the world.

"Quite simply, I believe in Catholic higher education and in the principles and values that the University upholds," says Fritz III. "Supporting the Notre Dame mission with our gifts will, hopefully, play a small but important part in allowing the University to flourish not only for our children, but for generations to come."



The Skrzynski Family Endowment for Excellence in Service Learning

Inspired by Notre Dame's commitment to service, observed while their daughter, Jane, was a student here, Ed and Deb Skrzynski established the Skrzynski Family Endowment for Excellence in Service Learning. The fund supports the Center for Social Concerns' Migrant Seminar Program in Immokalee, Florida.

"We have always loved Notre Dame's commitment to Christian values," says Deb, "and we were so pleased with the large number of students volunteering in

the South Bend community through the Center for Social Concerns that we wanted to provide an opportunity for service in our home state of Florida."

The Migrant Seminar is an embedded learning experience held during spring break, affording students both service and relational opportunities with the laborers in Immokalee, a hub of the tomato industry less than hour from affluent Naples. The essence of the program is to be present and to serve, learn, and advocate. Participating students explore issues related to farm labor exploitation and stand in solidarity with the workers, learning how to advocate for justice and basic human rights.

As benefactors of social service programs in Immokalee, the Skrzynskis felt they could have an even greater impact through their gifts to Notre Dame, seeing their endowment as a way to get the best and brightest minds to look at the problems of migrant farmworkers and devise solutions.

"If just one Notre Dame student is motivated to help migrant farmworkers," says Deb, "there will be a ripple effect of good works coming from our gifts."



Inaugural Notre Dame Day Draws a Global Audience

A new tradition was launched this year, as the Notre Dame family connected in an entirely new way. Notre Dame Day, billed as a "global celebration" of Our Lady's University, kicked off at 18:42 local time (6:42 p.m.) on April 27, 2014. The date honored that same day in 1879, when Father Sorin inspired the University to rebuild after a massive fire destroyed the original Main Building.

By way of streaming broadcast, social media, on-campus events, and participation from around the world, the Notre Dame

community shared stories and generously made gifts to their beloved University. The event drew more than 20,000 broadcast viewers from 83 countries, resulting in 18,000+ social media posts about #NDday and 4,049 donations totaling \$915,516.

The 29-hour broadcast, streamed live from LaFortune Student Center, featured interviews with and performances by Notre Dame celebrities, faculty, staff, and students. From the Bookstore Basketball courts to the top floor of the Hesburgh Library, roving reporters gave viewers real-time updates from campus. Members of the Notre Dame family were invited to watch, connect, give, and vote using online and mobile devices.

Notre Dame Day offered academic departments, institutes, and centers, as well as individual residence halls, athletic teams, and other programs, the opportunity to compete for "Challenge Funds" based on global donor participation and online viewing. Notre Dame students showed up in full force, competing against rival residence halls in trivia, tug-of-war, and the rallying of votes through social media.

"ProudtobeND" channels on Facebook, Twitter, and nd.edu continue the celebration of all things Notre Dame. The next Notre Dame Day is slated for April 27, 2015.



Annual Giving at Notre Dame represents the largest contingent of benefactors to the University, with gifts ranging from \$5 to \$100,000. These generous alumni, parents, and friends, who share a love for Notre Dame and a desire to make a difference, help to fund critical priorities throughout the University. In fiscal 2013–14, University donors contributed more than \$51 million to Annual Giving through the Notre Dame Fund and recognition societies.

A Revitalized Morris Inn

On September 1, 2013, the Morris Inn, a campus institution that has long served as the University's living room, reopened its doors after an extensive renovation. Originally built in 1952 with gifts from Ernest and Ella Morris, the facility quickly rose to prominence as *the* place for alumni, distinguished guests, and friends to experience the hospitality of the Notre Dame family firsthand.

Committed to keeping that tradition of service alive, Ernestine Raclin, the Morrises' daughter, together with her family and the Carmichael Foundation,

provided the lead gift for the renovation. "Our family has a long and deep emotional bond with Notre Dame and the Morris Inn," says Raclin. "We were very pleased to have an opportunity to ensure that the Inn continues to play a prominent role in the life of the University."

While the Inn's newly adopted Gothicstyle architecture—reflecting the dominant campus style—and 65,500-square-foot expansion make for an arresting first impression, the interior, too, is rife with striking enhancements. The reimagined space now includes the pub Rohr's, a gift of Jim and Sharon Rohr; the Thomas H. Quinn Family Room; and the new William and Mary Ann Smith Ballroom. The historic Sorin's restaurant, renewed through the benefaction of Alex and Kitchie McMurtrie, is now beautifully complemented by the Wind Family Fireside Terrace, an adjacent outdoor space donated by Larry and Cindy Wind.

The result is a welcoming and elegant living room, one poised to host and entertain Notre Dame family and friends for generations to come.




Sources of Capital Support

The Jim and Barbara Slack Charitable Remainder Trust

As loyal Domers, Jim and Barbara
Slack have been avid supporters of
unrestricted funds at the University since
Jim graduated in 1974. Recently, the
couple redoubled their commitment to
Notre Dame, establishing a charitable
remainder trust that would permit them
to give back in a significant way after
their deaths while also providing several
attractive benefits in the present: a lifetime income stream, an immediate
income tax deduction, and the opportunity
to invest with the Notre Dame Endowment.


The next step was determining how to designate the remainder of the trust after their passing. That question was soon answered, however, when Jim recalled an article he had read in *Notre Dame Magazine* about Neimann-Pick Type C (NPC), a rare genetic disorder that primarily affects children and results in early death.

The article detailed the efforts of
Notre Dame researchers and the Ara
Parseghian Medical Research Foundation
in finding a treatment. Moved by the
plight of families shattered by NPC—
and knowing that research on NPC and
other rare disorders is often severely

underfunded—the couple designated their trust for the Center for Rare and Neglected Diseases. Jim and Barbara's hope is that, with their gift and others, the center can advance its mission of developing drugs, vaccines, and treatments that can offer real and lasting hope to individuals and families suffering from a host of devastating illnesses.

"That's a legacy we can be proud of," says Jim.



For the second year in a row, a new record was set, with more than \$186 million committed, including large increases in bequests and trusts. Giving to donor advised funds, IRA charitable rollovers, and charitable gift annuities more than doubled over the previous year.




Gift Planning Total Commitments

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
The University wishes to extend a most sincere thank you to all the individuals and organizations whose generosity made fiscal 2013–14 a year without precedent in Notre Dame fundraising. New gifts and commitments totaled \$642 million, surpassing last year's record by more than \$250 million—a feat that seemed all but unimaginable until a few months ago.

Cash receipts finished at roughly \$330 million, more than \$40 million above the record set in fiscal 2007–08. The excitement generated by the first-ever Notre Dame Day helped to push unrestricted giving above \$50 million. Likewise, Corporate and Foundation Giving exceeded expectations this year, generating \$23 million and \$49 million, respectively.








Gift Income by Fiscal Year
