To call Don and Mickie Keough visionaries would be to only scratch the surface of a philanthropic legacy that will advance Notre Dame indefinitely. In 2014, the Keoughs established Notre Dame's first new school in almost a century, which hosts scholarship in peace, human rights, and international development. This landmark gift reflects the many roles played by the late Don Keough, who is survived by Mickie

The Mirza Family Professor of Islamic Thought and Muslim Societies

Sue Scribner Mirza '79 knows firsthand that interfaith dialogue not only enriches foreign relations but is also often personally profound. Sue, raised Irish Catholic, married Muzzafar "Muzzi" Mirza, a Pakistani immigrant raised Muslim. John '84 and Betsy Garibaldi have had a longtime interest in cancer research because both lost family members to the disease. Drawn to Notre Dame's ethical approach to this critical field, they established the Garibaldi Family Endowment for Excellence in Adult Stem Cell Research. Supporting the research of undergraduate and graduate students devoted to finding a cure allows the Garibaldis to help fulfill Father Sorin's founding vision of the University as a force for good in the world.


Notre Dame Day

The University celebrated the second annual Notre Dame Day on April 26–27 this year—a fitting tribute to the 136th anniversary of Father Sorin's return to campus in 1879, following the devastating fire that damaged much of the University. His vow to build a bigger and better Notre Dame was celebrated well this year. Members of the Notre Dame family shared their passions and showcased their talents in the action-filled broadcast, rallying alumni and friends to support over 779 University initiatives through their participation and inspiring over 16,550 gifts—the most successful college giving day on record! Notre Dame Day led the University to a record-breaking year in the number of total donors, with over 108,000 members of the Notre Dame family making a gift.

The Notre Dame Fund



The Corgel Family Rectorship

Jim '73 and Chris Corgel believe a Notre Dame education is "baked in the classroom but cemented through residential life." Jim says that as his life and relationships have evolved, the friends he made during college have been the constant. The belief that Notre Dame is among the very best at creating a transformational student experience, and the resolve to continue this tradition, inspired the Corgels to establish the University's first endowed rectorship. Chris says, "This incredible sense of community is so unique, and it wouldn't happen without the tireless work of our rectors and their staffs."

The McDonald Center for Student Well-Being

In establishing the McDonald Center, Mark Gallogly '79 and Lise Strickler have allowed the University to make a great leap forward in the Holy Cross-based mission to educate the whole person: mind, body, and spirit. Named for the couple's dear friend Rev. James E. McDonald, C.S.C., '79, the center will support comprehensive student health through prevention, intervention, and education programs. Lise says, "There is a growing need for mental health care services on college campuses across the United States, and Mark and I want to help lessen any stigma that students feel in seeking guidance on issues like depression, anxiety, eating disorders, or substance abuse. College can be a very challenging time in young people's lives, and our hope is that the McDonald Center can become a model for other schools in establishing approachable on-campus mental health support systems for whole-body wellness."

The Navari Family Center for Digital Scholarship

With the largest gift in the history of the Hesburgh Libraries, Rudy '66 and Jane Navari have ensured that Notre Dame will remain on the leading edge of academic technology through the Navari Family Center for Digital Scholarship. Comprising the Digital Research Lab and Digital Production Facility, the Navari Family Center will connect Notre Dame's students and faculty with state-of-the-art research tools while giving outside scholars access to resources unique to the University. "We trust this center will significantly enhance the learning experiences of Notre Dame students, staff, and faculty," say the Navaris.

The Notre Dame Women's Initiative

This fall, the Hesburgh Library North Entrance—a project led by the Notre Dame Women's Initiative to honor the late Father Ted Hesburgh — officially opened its doors to the campus community. Co-chaired by Notre Dame Trustees Cindy Parseghian '77 and Anne Thompson '79, the initiative celebrates Fr. Ted's vision and leadership in welcoming women to the University in 1972. The new "gateway to knowledge" gives direct access to library services for those living and working on the north side of campus. "Fr. Hesburgh gave us an unparalleled education of the heart, mind, and spirit to navigate the joys and challenges of life," say Cindy and Anne.




The Rodgers Family Legacy

One of Notre Dame's first African-American students, William Rodgers III '55 endured the era's adversity, met his beloved wife, Charlotte, while on campus, and became a respected physician. His son, Marty Rodgers '88, carries the legacy forward as a Notre Dame Trustee. The family's partnership with the University is characterized by the drive to foster diversity within her student body. To this end, the entire Rodgers familyincluding even the youngest grandchildren-established the Dr. William H. Rodgers III Memorial Scholarship to support minority students in pre-professional studies. In addition, Marty recently established a donor advised fund, a true investment in Notre Dame's promise.

The Marshall Family Trusts

In gratitude for the invaluable education that her son, C. Richard "Dick" Marshall '51, received at Notre Dame, Jean Gormley Marshall established charitable remainder trusts benefiting the University. Jean's trusts were followed by those of Dick's wife, Angela, who also established a trust naming Notre Dame a beneficiary. Dick and Angela's daughter, Susan, was instrumental this year in the transfer of her mother's trust, with Notre Dame now serving as trustee over assets invested in the Notre Dame Endowment. Together, the Marshall family trusts benefit in perpetuity the C. Richard Marshall Scholarship.








